

Sign-up for County's Emergency Notification Alerting System

The City would like to remind Mequon residents of an emergency notification alerting system that is available to all residents of Ozaukee County. Residents have long known that they may call 911 for police, fire or medical assistance. The Ozaukee County Sheriff's

Office, Public Health Department, and Emergency Management Division participate with a mass alert notification system called Alert Sense, which operates like a reverse of the 911 system. The County Dispatch, at their request or at the request of City Officials, can send voice and text messages that alert the community to a variety of emergency and nonemergency circumstances, such as crime/imminent danger, evacuation alert, the presence of hazardous materials, a local area emergency, or missing persons/Amber Alert. Tips for Disposing Leaves

Did you know that leaves falling from trees during autumn can pollute freshwater resources? When leaves pile up on streets, sidewalks, and driveways, they can be washed away by rainwater into storm drains. The leaves can clog storm drains, making it harder for rainwater to flow away safely which can cause local flooding. However, this is only the tip of the iceberg. When the leaves and other organic debris are left in the drain, they leach nutrients into local lakes and streams that encourage the growth of certain algae and bacteria that are harmful to people, plants, and wildlife.

Residents can help manage leaf waste by raking leaves and then bagging them, mulching the leaves, or using leaf pick-up services. Remember, every small effort counts when it comes to protecting the environment. By managing leaf waste properly, one can prevent stormwater pollution, reduce flooding, and keep water clean for everyone to enjoy. To learn more click **here**.
