Located on the western shores of Lake Michigan just north of Milwaukee, the City of Mequon boasts majestic lakeshore bluffs, stately homes, lush farmland and expansive open space. The community enjoys many parks, five golf courses, the winding Milwaukee River and easy access to the I-system for a convenient commute to Milwaukee. Mequon's rural heritage is preserved by high development standards and low-density zoning regulations. Fifty percent of the land within the City is undeveloped and still mostly farmed.

Mequon has one of the lowest crime rates and one of the lowest tax rates in the Metropolitan Milwaukee area. Property values have increased by an average of five percent each year for the last ten years. The K-12 school system is ranked one of the best in Wisconsin. Concordia University and the North Campus of the Milwaukee Area Technical College are located in Mequon and offer a broad range of programs. Prime healthcare facilities and services are readily available throughout the City and include Columbia St. Mary's Hospital. Mequon is also a business-friendly community with over 300 businesses and two industrial parks with small and mid-sized firms as well as large firms like Rockwell Automation.


The City of Mequon continues to strive to provide useful financial information to our residents. As part of this goal, the City has begun publishing the Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR). The PAFR places beneficial financial information in a clear, concise and more simplified format for the general public. The PAFR contains fiscal data from the City's Governmental funds, including the General Fund, Debt Service Fund, Capital Projects Fund, and other Non-Major Funds. Definitions can be found below. Enterprise funds are not represented in the PAFR.

The financial information found in this report is extracted directly from the City's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). The CAFR contains performance metrics, as well as discussion and analysis by management regarding the City's financial performance across all funds, including enterprise funds.

Financial statements presented in the CAFR are prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and audited by the public accounting firm Baker Tilly Virchow Krause, LLP.

In 2013, the City of Mequon was awarded its first Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA). This certificate is the highest form of recognition for excellence in state and local government financial reporting.



DEFINITIONS:

General Fund: General accounting fund of the City. This fund is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Debt Service Fund: Used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest, and related costs.

Capital Projects Fund: Used to account for acquisition of equipment, vehicles, land, and infrastructure greater than \$1,000.

Non-Major Funds: Used to account for the Park and Open Space, Revolving Loan and Police Reserve special revenue funds.

Enterprise Funds: Primarily based on user fees, these funds are operated much like a private business.

On behalf of the City of Mequon's Common Council, I am pleased to present the first Popular Annual Financial Report to the Citizens of Mequon. This report provides an overview of the current financial condition of the City; and a report of significant ongoing and future activities affecting our City. This administration and staff consider it an honor to serve our citizens and we believe that this report enhances the level of our accountability to you, our taxpayers.



Mequon is a very desirable location to live, work, raise a family and enjoy a great quality of life. In fact, *Money Magazine* ranked Mequon 23rd on a list of the top 50 suburbs in America. Additionally, *Movoto Real Estate* ranked Mequon the best place to live in Wisconsin and Mequon is ranked as one of the top 10 safest cities in Wisconsin by Safewise.com.

We have worked diligently to maintain a vibrant economy in our community through proactive planning and management of City's finances. These efforts have been recognized by Moody's Rating Service which has assigned their second highest bond rating of Aa1 to the City. This superior rating allows the City to obtain lower interest rates when issuing debt for capital projects, saving thousands of dollars in borrowing costs over time. These savings are used to help keep Mequon taxes amongst the lowest of any developed municipality in Wisconsin.

Our efforts in providing detailed and meaningful financial reports to you have also been recognized by outside sources such as the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA). Mequon has received the Distinguished Budget Presentation award for the last six years, and was awarded the Excellence for Financial Reporting award for the first time last year.



I am pleased to present for the first time the City of Mequon Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) for the year ended December 31, 2014. This report provides a brief analysis of where City revenues come from and where those dollars are spent, as well as an overview of trends in the local economy. Above all, it is designed to present a more easily understandable financial report in a spirit of bringing accurate information to all individuals who seek it.

This PAFR, generated internally by the City's Finance Department with the help of our entire staff, is a condensed and simplified overview of the 2014 City of Mequon's Comprehensive Financial Report (CAFR). The City's CAFR is comprised of more than 115 pages of detailed financial statements, notes, schedules and reports and has been—audited by an independent outside public accounting firm and received an unmodified opinion. An unmodified opinion means that the general purpose financial statements of the City are fairly presented in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principals (GAAP). While the City recognizes that analyzing financial statements can be challenging, especially for those who do not do so on a regular basis, it is our hope that you find this PAFR to be informative and understandable. Both the CAFR and PAFR will be made available online or upon request for those wishing to attain a more detailed perspective of the City's finances.

If I were asked to characterize the 2014 fiscal year for the City of Mequon, I believe the word would be "stability". FY2014 marked the fifth consecutive year that the City maintained a level budget and City tax rate. Even so, we were able to maintain the level of service necessary to provide an excellent quality of life for our citizens and business community. Moreover, the City maintained a respectful balance in its undesignated reserve fund (the "fund balance"). FY2014 concluded with a balance of \$2.5 million or 16.6% of the proposed 2015 budget. Having a stable fund balance lent itself to the City receiving an Aa1 credit rating from Moodys Rating Service. We remain diligent in managing our expenses and are continually looking for ways to improve our service delivery efficiencies. That said, you can be assured that your City is in good financial shape.

Looking ahead, I am pleased to say that the future is bright. Major commercial development initiatives for 2014 included development in both of the city's main commercial areas (Port Washington Road and Town Center). The City not only continued its implementation efforts for the Town Center but also expanded appropriate areas for additional single-family residential development served by public water and sewer. These development efforts are anticipated to generate new tax base value of approximately \$168,000,000.

As you review the PAFR, please share any questions, concerns or recommendations that you may have with us. We invite you to share your thoughts and opinions with us as we value your input and look forward to addressing any comments you may have.








Public Safety functions within the City of Mequon are comprised of the Police Department, Police Reserve, Communications, Inspections and the Fire Department.

Total expenditures for Public Safety during 2014 were \$6,767,586. The largest expenditure in this area continues to be Salaries & Benefits, although staffing levels have remained level.








Public Works is comprised of Fleet Services, Engineering, Highway and Recycling.

Public Works is responsible for areas such as snow removal, fleet repair and maintenance, road repair and maintenance, road striping, and much more.


Fiscal year 2014 saw an overall surplus for the Public Works Department.





Fiscal year 2014 saw a number of accomplishments for the Public Works Departments including:

- Completion of 600-700 repairs and preventative maintenance service for all departments.
- Performed annual evaluation of 210 miles of City roads and developed recommendations for repair and preventative maintenance.
- Completed over 10,790 feet of ditching and restoration, as well as 1,595 feet of culvert/ storm sewer installation.
- Maintained operation of the Recycling Facility for resident use with no increase in fees.







These services are provided to the community as a means to improve the overall quality of life in the City of Mequon.







The City's Conservation and Development efforts are coordinated by the Department of Community Development, which is responsible for policy analysis, long range planning, development site plan review, zoning code administration, economic development, landmarks administration, zoning code enforcement, geographic information systems (GIS), census/demographic coordination and general processing relative to development and redevelopment within the community. This Department is also responsible for the management of the City's Tax Increment Financing Districts and for attracting new businesses to the Community. Total expenditures for this department In FY2014 totaled \$410,622. The majority of these funds were spent on salaries and benefits for 3.5 full time equivalent employees that staff the department.



Debt per capita is calculated by taking the total outstanding debt for the entity as of year end, and multiplying the amount by the percent of equalized property in the City of Mequon and then dividing it by the City's total population.

This is used to depict the relative amount of debt City and other taxing jurisdictions have incurred, on a per resident (or capita) basis.
